THE CONGREGATION AT PRAYER FOR THE WEEK OF THE THIRD SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

"The Prodigal Brought Home" June 20 through June 26, 2021

The two sons of the parable are clearly sons of Israel whose inheritance was symbolized in the land allotted to them, but was really to be the Messianic King. The younger son's association with the pigs represents the depth of his uncleanness and his departure from faith in the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. His desire to eat the food fed to such unclean animals would have been horrifying to the Jewish listener, perhaps even more horrifying than his dallies with prostitutes. Jesus knew that the Pharisees regarded the "sinners" as such despicable characters. Yet the Father, the God of Abraham, loves this "sinner" as much as the "good son." It is Paul who teaches each of us to confess that we are just like this prodigal son. Look at this week's learn-by-heart verse: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners—of whom I am the worst. The Father sent His own Son out into the world among the prodigals to bring us back to the Father and the inheritance of sons.

CATECHISM FOR THE WEEK:

How Christians Should Be Taught To Confess

What is Confession?

Confession has two parts. First, that we confess our sins, and second, that we receive absolution, that is, forgiveness, from the pastor as from God Himself, not doubting, but firmly believing that by it our sins are forgiven before God in heaven.

What sins should we confess?

Before God we should plead guilty of all sins, even those we are not aware of, as we do in the Lord's Prayer; but before the pastor we should confess only those sins which we know and feel in our hearts.

Luther, Large Catechism, Eighth Commandment: Such is human nature that no one wants another to have as much as he himself has. Everyone tries to get all he can and lets the next man look out for himself. Yet we all want to seem upright, we put up the best front we can, and we try to keep the scoundrel within us hidden. We think up subtle devices and under the guise of fairness use sly maneuvers (improved versions of which are devised every day). About this we dare to boast brazenly, insisting that it be called shrewdness and good business sense, not dishonesty. We are abetted in this by jurists and lawyers who bend and stretch the law to suit their case, straining and misapplying words with no regard for equity or the neighbor's needs. In short, he who is most adept and clever at such games gets the best advantage out of the law, and, as the saying goes, "The law favors the alert." Thus this last commandment is not addressed to those whom the world considers scoundrels, but precisely to the most respectable—to those who look for approval as being decent and upright and who have not offended against the foregoing commandments. . . . The situation to which this commandment applies occurs most often in lawsuits by which someone attempts to get or squeeze something out of his neighbor. When people, for example, squabble and wrangle over a large inheritance, a piece of real estate, etc., they drag in and put to use any argument that has the slightest semblance of right, and they blow it up so much and deck it out so elaborately that the law tilts to their side and assigns them the property with a title so secure that it will stand firm beyond question or dispute. . . . This sort of thing happens also in ordinary business.

Someone slyly loosens something from another's grasp, and the victim gazes helplessly after the culprit as he disappears with it around a corner. Or seeing a

chance of perhaps making a profit—for example, at the expense of someone in trouble or debt who can neither hold on to his property nor avoid a loss if he sells—he hurries and pressures his victim until he has taken over half of his property or more; and yet this is considered an honest acquisition, not highway robbery or fraud. Hence the sayings, "first come, first served" and "grab yours while you have the chance" and let the next man take what's left. Who is clever enough to imagine the vast amounts one could get by such pretty pretenses of fair business dealing? The world, however, does not consider such practices wrong. It does not see that these are ways of taking advantage of the neighbor and forcing him to sacrifice what he cannot spare without being hurt. Yet no one wants others to do such things to him. From this it is clear that all these shifts and shams are hypocritical. (*LC*, 60-61, St. Louis: Concordia, 1978)

READINGS

Genesis 50:15-21 Romans 12:14-21 Luke 6:36-42

Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful. The words come upon our ears, and we confess that we are not at all merciful like the Father in heaven. We heard of the father's treatment of the prodigal son this week and know that our human nature does not want to cover over sin without demanding that others earn it first. Yet these words are not spoken simply for our condemnation. When God speaks His word over us, Be merciful, His word actually accomplishes in us what it proclaims. His Word makes us merciful. This life of mercy is not that we are nice all the time. More importantly, it is the life of the forgiveness of sins to which Jesus calls us. Have we judged others as being deserving of hell and condemned them to eternal punishment? Certainly, yet the Father has judged us through His Son. In Christ, the Father has declared that He does not want to condemn us, but to save us. He desires to draw all men into the bosom of Abraham, that is, into His own Fatherly bosom. So He calls you to give forth the abundance of mercy that has been poured into your bosom through the sufferings and death of Christ. It is to you that He has given the Blessed Sacrament, the cup that is running over into your bosom each time you kneel at this altar. This limitless cup of mercy will spill forth out of you to those around you in the forgiveness of sins. The measure you are called to use is the measure of the Gospel which views all things fulfilled in Christ. He is the good measure who has called us to live in repentance and the forgiveness of sins. Jesus is the One through whom we see the Father's mercy.
