Isaiah 65:17-25 (ESV)

¹⁷ "For behold, I create new heavens and a new earth, and the former things shall not be remembered or come into mind.

THE CONGREGATION AT PRAYER FOR THE WEEK OF THE TWENTY-SEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

"Watchful Virgins"
November 21 through November 27, 2021

November 30 is St. Andrew's Day, which is used to determine the First Sunday in Advent and the beginning of a new Church Year. Andrew was one of the first apostles called by our Lord. He and his brother Peter were called to be fishers of men, that is, preachers of the Gospel. His association with the beginning of Advent reminds us of two things. First, the Church is the place where the Gospel is to be preached to all nations. Through this Gospel, the Holy Spirit calls men to faith and brings in a fresh catch of fish. Second, Andrew's association with the feeding of the 5,000 reminds us that Christ continues to feed us in His Church upon His own body and blood for the forgiveness of sins. Advent reminds us that through His coming to us in Word and Sacrament Christ prepares us for His final coming to judge the living and the dead. Andrew would be martyred for preaching that Gospel. Tradition tells us that much of his preaching was done in Greece. He would be crucified in Scythia for his refusal to stop preaching Christ crucified. Later tradition added the idea that he was crucified on a cross in the shape of an X. Today such a cross is often used on symbols for Andrew.

CATECHISM FOR THE WEEK: The Lord's Prayer

The Introduction

Our Father who art in heaven.

What does this mean? With these words God tenderly invites us to believe that He is our true Father and that we are His true children, so that in all boldness and confidence we may ask Him as dear children ask their dear father.

The First Petition

Hallowed be thy name.

What does this mean? God's name is certainly holy in itself, but we pray in this petition that it may be kept holy among us also.

How is God's name kept holy? God's name is kept holy when the Word of God is taught in its truth and purity, and we, as the children of God, also lead holy lives according to it. Help us to do this, dear Father in heaven! But anyone who teaches or lives contrary to God's Word profanes the name of God among us. Protect us from this, heavenly Father!

Luther, Lectures on Genesis 20:11-13: Here one should note that Abraham says that he spoke most respectfully to his wife. He did not give an order and did not say: "You must obey me; I compel you; I demand from you." No, he said: "I beg you," and he does not consider her action obedience; he considers it a favor, as though by a superior person, in accordance with Peter's precept (1 Peter 3:7): "Bestow honor on the female sex." But why does Moses record this? Doubtless in order to present an example of a very fine marriage, something which is indeed a rarity on earth but is most pleasing both to God and to men. Therefore, by means of this very example, Peter exhorts spouses to learn to love each other and to treat each other with respect and not as people are now in the habit of doing. Husbands generally are lions in their homes and are harsh toward wives and domestics. Similarly, the wives generally domineer everywhere and regard their husbands as servants. But it is foolish for a husband to want to display his manly courage and heroic valor by ruling his wife. On the other hand, it is also unbearable if wives want to dominate. Such marriages – where both are capricious – are common, as the proverb has it: "Three things are rare, but they are pleasing to God: harmony among brothers, love among neighbors, and accord between spouses." The reason is that people generally enter into this kind of life without prayer and, like swine, regard only what is carnal. Therefore, the wife does not see what is truly good in her husband. On the other hand, the husband sees in his wife only what displeases him. Since

there is no mutual tolerance between them, quarrels and countless outbursts of anger arise. Therefore, this example deserves frequent attention from married people in order that they may learn how to live together amicably. For one who is unwilling to overlook anything but wants to go to extremes in all his demands will lead a most wretched life. Besides, he will be irksome to others; for, if I may say so, this life is truly scurvy, ulcerous, and full of troubles. Therefore, one who lives in it will not find favorable conditions everywhere. "Where there is fire," they say, "there is bound to be smoke." Thus troubles are everywhere added to favorable conditions, but pious hearts will bear the troubles with patience and thank God for the favorable conditions. The fact that Abraham gives Sarah the all-inclusive instruction: "In every place to which we come say that I am your brother" is evidence of his great weakness and inordinate fear; for it indicates that he is afraid not only of the people of Gerar but also of all other men. For this reason, he did not have the courage anywhere to admit that Sarah was his wife. But why did Moses record this conduct, hardly creditable, about such a great man? He does this for our sakes, for the virtues of the saints should be praised in such a manner that we, nevertheless, conclude that they were human beings and that they both had and endured something human. (LW 3:353-354, St. Louis: Concordia, 1960)

READINGS

Jeremiah 23:5-8 Romans 13:8-14 Matthew 21:1-9

On the First Sunday in Advent, we look forward to the future coming of Christ in glory by confessing that He has already come in humility. As Jesus approaches Jerusalem, He comes to Bethphage, the house of unripe figs, a prophetic reference to the unbelief of the Jews who have not listened to the preaching of Jesus. He had come to them righteous and having their salvation, but they had rejected Him. The daughters of Jerusalem had not heeded the words of Song of Songs 2:13 to be prepared for the arrival of the Beloved. Jesus is that Beloved who comes mounted upon the donkey, as a figure of the Old Testament Church in which the proclamation of the promised Messiah had been sounded forth. The colt signifies the New Testament Church that will now bear Jesus to the ends of the earth through the preaching of the Gospel. Through this Gospel, we are made beasts of burden, that is, those who are ridden by Christ that we might be brought through the gates of the heavenly Jerusalem. To confess ourselves as such lowly beasts of burden is to acknowledge that we are either ridden by the devil as our master or ridden by Christ, the Master who purchases us with His own blood. It is the prayer of the Church that we might always be those who bear the light burden of Christ and are driven by Him along the narrow path. So we gather to sing that ancient song, Hosanna! Blessed is He that comes in the name of the Lord, in the confidence that He who comes in the lowly elements of bread and wine will transform our lowly bodies into glorious bodies in heaven.
