THE READINGS AND PSALMODY FOR THE FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY July 4, 2021

THE OLD TESTAMENT READING

1 Kings 19:11-21 (ESV)

¹¹ And he said, "Go out and stand on the mount before the Lord." And behold, the Lord passed by, and a great and strong wind tore the mountains and broke in pieces the rocks before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind. And after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake. ¹² And after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire. And after the fire the sound of a low whisper. ¹³ And when Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his cloak and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave. And behold, there came a voice to him and said, "What are you doing here, Elijah?" ¹⁴He said, "I have been very jealous for the Lord, the God of hosts. For the people of Israel have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword, and I, even I only, am left, and they seek my life, to take it away." ¹⁵ And the Lord said to him, "Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus. And when you arrive, you shall anoint Hazael to be king over Syria. ¹⁶ And Jehu the son of Nimshi you shall anoint to be king over Israel, and Elisha the son of Shaphat of Abel-meholah you shall anoint to be prophet in your place. ¹⁷ And the one who escapes from the sword of Hazael shall Jehu put to death, and the one who escapes from the sword of Jehu shall Elisha put to death. ¹⁸ Yet I will leave seven thousand in Israel, all the knees that have not bowed to Baal, and every mouth that has not kissed him." ¹⁹ So he departed from there and found Elisha the son of Shaphat, who was plowing with twelve yoke of oxen in front of him, and he was with the twelfth. Elijah passed by him and cast his cloak upon him. ²⁰ And he left the oxen and ran after Elijah and said, "Let me kiss my father and my mother, and then I will follow you." And he said to him, "Go back again, for what have I done to you?" ²¹ And he returned from following him and took the yoke of oxen and sacrificed them and boiled their flesh with the yokes of the oxen and gave it to the people, and they ate. Then he arose and went after Elijah and assisted him.

THE EPISTLE READING

1 Corinthians 1:18-25 (ESV)

¹⁸ For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ¹⁹ For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart." ²⁰ Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? ²¹ For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, it pleased God through the folly of what we preach to save those who believe. ²² For Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, ²³ but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, ²⁴ but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. ²⁵ For the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men.

Luke 5:1-11 (ESV)

¹ On one occasion, while the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he was standing by the lake of Gennesaret, ² and he saw two boats by the lake, but the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. ³ Getting into one of the boats, which was Simon's, he asked him to put out a little from the land. And he sat down and taught the people from the boat. ⁴ And when he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch." ⁵ And Simon answered, "Master, we toiled all night and took nothing! But at your word I will let down the nets." ⁶ And when they had done this, they enclosed a large number of fish, and their nets were breaking. ⁷ They signaled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both the boats, so that they began to sink. ⁸ But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord." ⁹ For he and all who were with him were astonished at the catch of fish that they had taken, ¹⁰ and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. And Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching men." 11 And when they had brought their boats to land, they left everything and followed him.

Following upon the discussion of God's mercy is this week's account of that mercy at work in the office of the holy ministry. God has ordained that this office be His means of proclaiming the Gospel to the world. In fact, immediately after confessing the doctrine of justification we Lutherans confess, "That we may obtain this faith, the Ministry of Teaching the Gospel and administering the Sacraments was instituted. For through the Word and Sacraments, as through instruments, the Holy Ghost is given, who works faith, where and when it pleases God, in them that hear the Gospel" Through this Office, the fish are drawn into the boat of the Church. From Peter's own words, we learn that it is not the man but the Office of the Preaching of the Gospel which bestows faith. Yet God has appointed that weak vessels should be the means for Him to accomplish the work of creating faith that we are saved not for our own merits, but for Christ's sake.

CATECHISM FOR THE WEEK:

How Christians Should Be Taught To Confess

What is the Office of the Keys?

The Office of the Keys is that special authority which Christ has given to His Church on earth to forgive the sins of repentant sinners, but to withhold forgiveness from the unrepentant as long as they do not repent. *Where is this written?*

This is what St. John the Evangelist writes in chapter twenty: The Lord Jesus breathed on His disciples and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone his sins, they are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven." *John 20:22-23*

Luther, Large Catechism, Sixth Commandment: Let us, therefore, first of all note carefully how very highly God honors and extols married life by giving it His sanction and protection in the Ten Commandments. He sanctioned it earlier in the Fourth Commandment, "You shall honor your father and your mother." But here, as I said, he safeguards and protects it. Therefore, he wants to see it honored, upheld, and treated also by us as being divinely instituted and full of blessing. For He established it as the first one of all His institutions, and He created man and woman with obvious differences, not for wickedness, but that they may be and remain attracted to each other, be fruitful, have children, care for them, and bring them up to the glory of God. God has, therefore, most richly blessed marriage above all other estates. In addition, everything that the world contains He has assigned and devoted to providing marriage amply and richly with all that it needs. . . . Therefore, I have always taught that we should not look down upon marriage or undervalue it as the blind world and the false clergy are doing. We are rather to view it in the light of the Word of God, which adorns and sanctifies it. Marriage is not merely to be placed on a level with other estates; it is to be put ahead and above them all, whether that be emperor, princes, bishops, or anyone else. . . . Remember, in the second place, that marriage is not only an honorable but also a necessary estate, one that is solemnly commanded by God. In general, men and women of every circumstance, having been created for it, belong in marriage. . . . Where nature as implanted by God has its way, it is not possible to remain chaste except within marriage. For flesh and blood remain flesh and blood, and the natural tendencies and attractions proceed without restraint or hindrance, as everyone can see and sense.

Therefore, in order that it might be easier to avoid unchastity in some measure, God has established marriage so that everyone may have his assigned portion and be happy with it, although even here the grace of God is needed to keep the heart pure. I am saying this in order that young people may be urged to acquire a love for married life and know that it is a blessed estate pleasing to God. Thus in time one might again turn the situation around to the point where marriage would again be honored and there would be a reduction of wild, disorderly conduct, such as is now everywhere prevalent in public prostitution and other disgraceful vices resulting from contempt for married life. Parents and civil authorities, therefore, have the duty of supervising the young so that they are brought up to live disciplined and respectable lives and, when they are grown, become honorably married in the fear of God. God will then add his blessing and grace so that people find joy and happiness in marriage. (*LC*, 46-47, St. Louis: Concordia, 1978)

July 11, 2021 "Righteousness That Matters"

READINGS

Exodus 20:1-17 Romans 6:1-11 Matthew 5:17-26

These verses remind us that it is not our righteousness, but the righteousness of Christ that is enough. The Law always condemns us. Any other use of the Law to soften its effect or to make us feel better about ourselves is a false use. The Law and the Prophets teach us that all our righteousness is as filthy rags. The Law and the Prophets are not the old message that has been replaced by the new and improved message of the New Testament. They were inspired by the Spirit and preach Christ as the only salvation for sinful men. In other words, the Old Testament really preaches the righteousness of Christ. Christ does not abolish the message of the Law for it is necessary to kill the Old Adam. It is Jesus who is killed by that same Law for our sakes and in our place. Therefore, it is Jesus who does and teaches the commandments for He has borne the full punishment of the Law for us. Through Baptism the Old Adam is drowned and the New Man, Christ, lives in us. Through Baptism the righteousness of Christ is freely bestowed upon us that dressed in the blood of Christ we might stand before the Father. Baptism is justification at work as the sinner is declared righteous by the Father for the sake of His Son.
